Kremlin confirms US envoy's visit as talks on ending war in Ukraine gain momentum

KYIV: A senior Kremlin official confirmed Wednesday that U.S. special envoy Steve Witkoff is set to visit Moscow next week as efforts to find a consensus on ending the nearly four-year war between Russia and Ukraine pick up speed. But Yuri Ushakov, Russian President Vladimir Putin's foreign affairs adviser, insisted that Kremlin officials still haven't seen a U.S. peace proposal, even though representatives of the United States, Russia and Ukraine held talks earlier this week in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. "Contact is ongoing, including via telephone, but no one has yet sat down at a roundtable and discussed this

point by point. That hasn't happened," Ushakov told Russian state media. Ukrainian officials didn't confirm whether U.S. Army Secretary Dan Driscoll, who in recent weeks has played a high-profile role in the peace efforts, would be in Kyiv in the coming days, as U.S. President Donald Trump indicated Tuesday. Trump's plan for ending the war became public last week, setting off a spate of diplomatic maneuvering. The initial version appeared heavily slanted toward Russian demands for halting Moscow's invasion of its neighbor. After weekend talks in Geneva between U.S. and Ukrainian officials, President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said the plan

could be "workable," although key points remain unresolved. A Ukrainian official said that Zelenskyy hoped to meet with Trump in the coming days. Witkoff's role in the peace efforts came under a renewed spotlight Tuesday when a report indicated that he coached Ushakov, the Putin aide, on how Russia's leader should pitch Trump on the Ukraine peace plan. Trump described Witkoff's reported approach to the Russians in the call as "standard" negotiating procedure. "He's got to sell this to Ukraine. He's got to sell Ukraine to Russia," Trump told reporters aboard Air Force One as he flew to his home in Florida on Tuesday night.

13 people killed in fire engulfing Hong Kong high-rise residential buildings, fire services say

HONG KONG: Thirteen people were killed in a fire that spread across seven high-rise apartment buildings in a Hong Kong housing complex, and others were still trapped, the city's fire services said Wednesday. Nine people were declared dead at the scene and four others who were sent to the hospital were later confirmed dead, authorities told reporters. At least 15 others were injured. About 700 people have been evacuated to temporary shelters.

The raging fire sent up a column of flames and thick smoke as it spread quickly on bamboo scaffolding and construction netting that had been set up around the exterior of the housing complex in Tai Po district, in the New Territories. Records show the housing complex consisted of eight blocks with almost 2,000 apartments housing about 4,800 people. Video from the scene showed multiple buildings close to each other ablaze, with bright flames and smoke shooting out of



many of the apartments' windows as night fell. Firefighters were aiming water at the intense flames from high up on ladder trucks.

The blaze started mid afternoon and after nightfall authorities upgraded it to a level 5 alarm, the highest level of severity, the Fire Services Department said. The fire

was still raging after midnight local time. Firefighters deployed 128 fire trucks and 57 ambulances to the scene. The dead included one firefighter and another was being treated for heat exhaustion, Fire Services Department Director Andy Yeung told reporters. Police said earlier that they had received

multiple reports of people trapped in the affected buildings, but did not provide details. Lo Hiu-fung, a Tai Po District Council member, told local TV station TVB earlier Wednesday that most of the residents trapped in the fire were believed to be elderly people. District officials in Tai Po have opened temporary shelters for people left homeless by the fire. "I've given up thinking about my property," a resident who only provided his surname, Wu, told TVB. "Watching it burn like that was really frustrating."

Tai Po is a suburban area in the New Territories, in the northern part of Hong Kong and near the border with the mainland Chinese city of Shenzhen. Bamboo scaffolding is a common sight in Hong Kong at building construction and renovation projects, though the government said earlier this year that it would start phasing it out for public projects because of safety concerns.

Bangladesh's convicted ex-PM Hasina's party announces nationwide protests till Nov 30

NEW DELHI/DHAKA: Bangladesh's ousted prime minister Sheikh Hasina's Awami League party on Tuesday announced nationwide agitations and "resistance marches" till November 30 in protest against the death sentence handed to the former premier by what it described as an "illegal" tribunal. On November 17, the International Crimes Tribunal (ICT-BD) sentenced 78-year-old Hasina to death along with then home minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal on charges of committing "crimes against humanity" after a trial held in absentia. Hasina is currently in India, while Kamal is also believed to be hiding in the country.

In a post on its official social media account, the Awami League alleged that the tribunal's verdict was part of a political "conspiracy" by the Muhammad Yunus-led interim government to keep Hasina and the party "out of the election" scheduled for February next year. Rejecting the "illegal verdict of the illegal ICT tribunal" and demanding the resignation of Yunus, the party announced protests, demonstrations and "resistance marches across all districts and upazilas (sub-districts) until November 30". The party said the "farical" judgment had been "rejected with contempt" by citizens and described the tribunal proceedings as a "mockery of a trial." The Awami League said it was engaging with grassroots workers, political leaders and stakeholders to counter what it called "anti-state conspiracies," and vowed to lead nationwide resistance against any attempts to exclude pro-liberation forces from the electoral process. "A staged election will not be allowed in Bangladesh. It will be resisted at any cost," it said, adding that a "tough nationwide movement" would be announced soon. Hasina's Awami League government was toppled in a student-led violent protest termed as the "July Uprising" on August 5 last year. Three days later, Nobel Laureate Yunus flew from Paris at the call of the protesting students to assume the charge of the interim government as its chief adviser.

Landslides, flash floods on Indonesia's Sumatra island leave at least 17, six missing

MEDAN: Rescuers recovered more bodies in the search for dozens of people buried under landslides or swept away after torrential rains unleashed flash floods and triggered landslides on Indonesia's Sumatra island, increasing the death toll to 17 and leaving six people missing, officials said Wednesday. Rescue teams were struggling to reach affected areas in six regencies of North Sumatra province after the monsoon rains over the past week caused rivers to burst their banks, tearing through hilly villages as mud, rocks and trees tumbled down, leaving destruction in their wake, the National Police said in a statement.

Rescue workers by Wednesday had recovered at least five bodies and three injured people in the worst-hit city of Sibolga and were searching for four villagers who were reported missing, the statement said. In the neighboring district of Central Tapanuli, landslides hit several

homes, killing at least a family of four, and floods submerged nearly 2,000 houses and buildings. Rescuers retrieved seven more bodies in South Tapanuli district, raising the death toll to eight, after floods and landslides also uprooted trees, prompting more than 2,800 residents to flee to temporary shelters and injuring 58 others, said National Disaster Mitigation Agency's spokesperson Abdul Muhari.

He said landslides also hit 50 houses in North Tapanuli district and destroyed at least two main bridges in the region. Floods had cut off a bridge in Mandailing Natal and submerged hundreds of houses in the hilly district and its neighboring Padang Sidempuan city, while a main road was blocked by mud and debris on Nias island. Videos on social media show water cascading down rooftops as panicked residents scramble for safety. In some areas, flash floods rose rapidly,

transforming streets into raging torrents carrying tree trunks and debris. Sibolga police chief Eddy Inganta said emergency shelters have been set up and authorities urged residents in high-risk zones to evacuate immediately, warning that continued rainfall could trigger more landslides after six landslides in the hilly city flattened 17 houses and a café.

"Bad weather and mudslides hampered the rescue operation," Inganta said, adding that access remains limited as rescuers battle harsh conditions. Tuesday's disasters occurred the same day the National Disaster Mitigation Agency declared the official end of relief efforts in two areas of Indonesia's main island of Java after 10 days of operations. More than 1,000 rescue workers had been deployed to search for people buried under landslides triggered by torrential rains that left 38 people dead in Central Java's districts of Cilacap and Banjarnegara.

Brazil's former President Jair Bolsonaro begins 27-year prison sentence for coup attempt

BRASILIA, BRAZIL: Former Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro on Tuesday started his 27-year prison sentence for leading a coup attempt, to the surprise of many in the South American nation who doubted he would ever end up behind bars. Supreme Court Justice Alexandre de Moraes, who has overseen the case, ruled Bolsonaro will remain in custody after being preemptively arrested on Saturday. Supporters and detractors of the embattled leader gathered outside the federal police headquarters after the order was issued, some calling for Bolsonaro's release and others toasting to his imprisonment. The far-right leader had been under house arrest since August and was taken in on Saturday after trying to break his ankle monitor. Bolsonaro blamed "hallucinations", a claim that de Moraes dismissed in his preemptive arrest order. Bolsonaro will not have any contact with the few other inmates at the federal police headquarters. His 12-square-meter room has a bed, a private bathroom, air conditioning, a TV set and a desk, according to federal police. He will have free access to his doctors and lawyers, but others will have to get their access approved by the Supreme Court.

Israel identifies the latest remains returned from Gaza as hostage Dror Or

JERUSALEM: Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Wednesday that Israel had identified the latest remains returned from Gaza as hostage Dror Or. That leaves the bodies of two hostages in Gaza as the first phase of the Israel-Hamas ceasefire agreement nears a conclusion. Palestinian militants released Or's remains Tuesday. Israel has agreed to release 15 Palestinian bodies for each hostage returned. Dror Or was killed by Islamic Jihad militants who overran his home in Kibbutz Beeri on Oct. 7, 2023, Israel's military said. His wife, Yonat Or, was also killed in the attack. That day, Palestinian militants killed some 1,200 people across southern Israel and abducted 251 to Gaza. Kibbutz Beeri was one of the hardest-hit farming communities in that attack that started the war in Gaza. Two of Or's children, Alma and Noam, were abducted by the militants on Oct. 7 and released in a hostage deal in November 2023. Almost all of the hostages or their remains have been returned in ceasefires or other deals. The remains of two — one Israeli and one Thai national — are still in Gaza. Gaza's Health Ministry says more than 69,700 Palestinians have been killed and 170,800 injured in Israel's retaliatory offensive. The toll has increased during the ceasefire both from new Israeli strikes and from the recovery and identification of bodies of people killed earlier in the war.

Direct flights between Pakistan, Bangladesh from December

LAHORE: Direct flights between Pakistan and Bangladesh will begin from next month, a significant leap in strengthening connectivity between the two countries, Dhaka's top diplomat said here Wednesday. There has been no direct flight between Pakistan and Bangladesh for the last several years. As relations between the two countries improved this year, two Pakistani private airlines have recently received approval for direct flights.

"Mahan Air will start three weekly flights between Dhaka and Karachi from next month," Bangladesh's High Commissioner in Islamabad, Iqbal Hussain Khan, told businessmen at Lahore Chamber of

Commerce & Industry (LCCI) here. He, however, did not specify any date or other details.

The high commissioner further said: "Visa process has been simplified. Visas are now being issued on the joint recommendation of LCCI and the Bangladesh Honorary Consulate in Lahore. Visas will be issued to members within three to four days, making travel between the two countries faster and easier," he added. "The three weekly flights between Dhaka and Karachi will be a significant leap in strengthening connectivity between the two countries," Khan added.

Mahan Airlines, operating under the name Mahan Air, is a privately owned Iranian airline based



in Tehran. Since prime minister Sheikh Hasina was ousted after massive student-led protests in Bangladesh on August 5, 2024 and Muhammad Yunus took over as the Chief Adviser of the Interim government there, relations between Dhaka and Islamabad have continued to improve on several fronts.

Recently, two Pakistani private airlines -- Fly Jinnah and AirSial -- received approval from the aviation authorities in Bangladesh to operate direct flights between Pakistan and Bangladesh. High Commissioner Khan said that a direct cargo shipping service between the two countries will also be launched soon. "While a

cargo service between the two countries has been operational since last December, rising trade demand now requires a dedicated direct cargo route," he said. LCCI President Faheemur Rehman Saigol said Pakistan can increase rice exports to Bangladesh and Dhaka can supply fresh pineapples to Pakistan besides trade in textiles and ready-made garments. He said both nations have opportunities to collaborate in IT, automobiles and other industries.

"At present, bilateral trade stands at USD 700 million but it may increase up to USD 3 billion over the next few years," Saigol said and added that direct flights would further enhance trade relations.
